Violation of Cattle Law.
 In order to prevent the spreading of the disease known as southern, epidemic, of Texas fever of cattle, and to further the work of eradicating the ticks which convey this disease, the United States Department of Agriculture maintains a strict quarantine on the infected region and endeavors to enforce this quarantine by court proceedings when necessary. In a recent case in the United States court for the Western District of North Carolina at Asheville, one W. W. Anderson entered a plea of guilty to a charge violating the law and regulations, and a fine of \$100 and costs was imposed by the court. The offense consisted in driving as soon as certain cattle from Fannin County, Ga., through Polk County, Tenn., which two counties were under quarantine, into Cherokee county, N. C., which county was outside the quarantined area.

Opening a window or a door in most cases is objectionable. That creates a draft and starts a cold, which brings discomfort if not disease. It would be interesting to see the statistics, to know which was the more fatal—drafts or tuberculosis. There are few places for general assemblages that are hygienically ventilated.
