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The Election.
Election returns at this writing indicate a democratic landslide. Woodrow Wilson carries New Jersey for governor; John W. Burton leads for governor in Indiana; Louis Bellamy for governor of Connecticut; John A. Dix, governor of New York; E. N. Hart, governor of Massachusetts. The returns show that the democrats will have a safe working majority in the next congress.

There were 220 votes polled at Florida, 37 being republicans and 183 democrats.

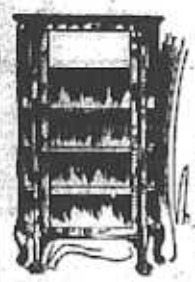
