Hon. C. D. Carmichael Speaks in Favor of the Amendment

Makes Eloquent Appeal to the Intelligence of Voters.

A LARGE CROWD PRESENT

Hon. C. D. Carmichael, of Covington county, in the course of his Monday night address in favor of the proposed amendment to the constitution, addressed a large and enthusiastic audience. There were about 300 or 400 people present, including some judges. If the amendment which Mr. Carmichael supported, was an indication of how the crowd reacted to the question, the amendment would have a very good chance of being passed.

**THE
Constitutional
Amendment
Has no Home or Claus
READ IT!**

Let the following be adopted as Ar-
ticle XIV of the Constitution
of Alabama.

Section 1. The manufacture,
sale and keeping for sale of al-
coholic and malt liquors and other
intoxicating beverages shall be
forever prohibited in this state,
but alcohol may be sold for medi-
cal purposes or for use in the
brewery, or in the distillery, or in
the manufacture of any other
legitimate product.

Section 2. Nothing in the con-
stitution of Alabama shall be
construed to prevent the legisla-
ture under the police power from
designating places where such
liquors may not be kept or sold.

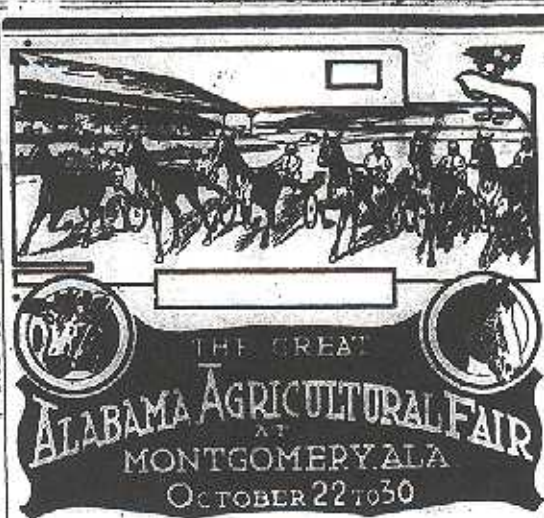
The choice of the electors shall be de-
termined by a vote cast by ballot
and the electors shall express
the will by marking the ballot.

Results are encouraging from
every corner of the state with

the rescue of the amendment, and

ON THE RUN

An incident occurred in
Germansburg this week,

some time for Mr. Thomas,
Mr. Carmichael could not speak,
not wishing to take advantage of
his opponent's failure to appear. Af-
ter waiting Mr. Thomas came
and without offering any ap-
pearance that he was going to
debate to speak.

However, he did not go to the
venue, but after waiting in that
direction, turned and went to
Geneva. Mr. Carmichael follow-
ed, except that he was clearly afraid
to debate the question in a
open manner. This is clearly
an admission that they are on
the weak side of the question and
realize the fact of it, even if
they think they were right
and the majority to back
them, they would not be afraid
to discuss the matter. It cer-
tainly seems that this is only
another indication that the

ANTS PROTECT PLANT.

How They Defend Against Leaf-Eating Insects.

A standing army of ants for do- ing a deadly work of leaf-eating insects is kept and protected with foot by a small plant of Minnesota. In this species there are two large thorns at the base of each leaf, which hold the insect in place, and make a deep furrow in the leaf. The ants then enter the furrow and eat the insect, thus protecting the plant without doing it any injury.

When the plant is threatened by an invasion of leaf-eating ants which would damage it the ants come from the soil and enter the furrow. They then eat the insect and protect the plant.

In one of the most notable of these ant plants the ants eat the insects that would eat the leaves. The ants then enter the furrow and eat the insect, thus protecting the plant without doing it any injury.

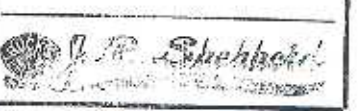
