Our First Great Need

When one goes to the bottom of the matter, it appears that a re-directed system of education is the fundamental need in the whole problem of rural progress anywhere. I talked to an editor from New York State not long ago and he told me that in quiet good roads, rural mail delivery, rural telephones, etc., the drift of the towns in Central New York was still marked.

'And it is bound to continue,' was his remark, 'until the schools themselves recognize the dignity of farm life and begin to teach the boys and girls in the formative period of their lives that knowledge and skill may be applied to farm work as well as to other work. So long as the objective point of our rural educational system seems to be to teach them to get out of the farm life, so long will the drift continue.'

I believe that this theory is correct. I recall that when myself a pupil in a country school one of the deskmates came to me one day and said, 'I am not going to attend any longer as I have decided to be a farmer'—and his decision was the natural result of the most extreme instruction in force in all our rural schools.

It is high time, indeed, for us to develop a series of text books and a complete educational system which will train pupils for farm life as well as for town life—Chas. F. Frost in Starbuck, (Mich.) Progressive Farmer and Gazette.

Baldwin County Leads

It is reported that Baldwin county has more peach trees than any other county in the state and it is estimated that there are thirty and forty thousand have been planted in that county, says the Valley Outlook. The largest grove is the Deering orchard near Leakey with 1,000 loaded trees and the Wilcox orchard near Perdido Beach with 1,500 loaded trees. Besides these there are several groves owned Foley with four to five hundred trees and nearly every farmer in the north and central portion of the county has two to five trees. Some of these trees are now in bearing and many more will come in next year.

An Ordinance

To Provide for the Issuance of Five Thousand Dollar Bonds by the City of Florida.

Whereas, Article IV, embracing sections 1421 to 1428 of the Code of Alabama, 1907 provides for the issuance of bonds by municipalities, corporations, and the state of Alabama, and the conditions and limitations under which and the manner by which such bonds may be issued;

Whereas, in accordance with said section, an ordinance was passed by the City Council of Florida on the 7th day of June 1910 authorizing and calling a election of the qualified electors of said city for the purpose of voting upon and deciding the question as to whether the bonds of said city to the amount of Five Thousand Dollars at least intervals at the rate of five per cent per annum to run twenty years should issue for the purpose of building a public street house in said city;

Whereas, notice of said election was duly given by the City Council of Florida in the Florida News, a newspaper published in said City once a week, for three consecutive weeks, as required by said statute; and

Whereas, said election was duly held July 11 1910 in accordance with said ordinance, calling the same and is accordance with said statute; and

Whereas, the City Council met July 12th 1910, the next day after the holding of said election, and a canvassing board and canvassed the returns of said election, and as a result of said canvass the said canvassing board did declare that at said election 123 votes were cast in favor of bond issue and 3 votes were cast against bond issue; and the said board thereupon declared the same and the said ordinance carried in favor of said bond issue; and

Whereas, the said ordinance, calling said bonds and the same, is hereby approved and carried out.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of Florida, Alabama, as follows:

SECTION ONE: That there are hereby authorized and directed to be issued, and to be held by the City of Florida, ten (10) negotiable coupon gold bonds in the total amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), to bear date as of August 1st 1910, and payable August 1st 1930, with the option of their payment, said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of February and August of each year, until the principal and interest thereon shall have been paid in full; and interest on said bonds to be accrued by five (5) interest coupons of twelve dollars and fifty cents (125) each, attached to each of said bonds. The said bonds shall be computed from one (1) to ten (10), both inclusive, and both principal and interest thereon shall be made payable in gold coin of the United States or equal to the present standard of weight and fineness, as the First National Bank in the City of Florida, Ala. said bonds and coupons shall be signed in full by the Mayor and the City Clerk of the City of Florida by the Mayor and the bonds shall have the corporate seal of the said City affixed thereon.

SECTION TWO: That the said bonds as well as the coupons to be attached thereto, shall be substantially of the form and content of the exhibits and specifications hereinafter provided, which form and content forms and the conditions, covenants and stipulations therein contained are hereby approved, adopted and ratified and with the necessary variations as to numbers and interest maturities, shall be substantially as follows, to-wit:

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. State of Alabama, Covington County, City of Florida, Five Per Cent Gold Bonds. Know All Men by These Presents, That the City of Florida in the County of Covington and State of Alabama, is ready and willing to pay to the bearer on the first day of August 1910, with the option of their payment, the principal sum of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

With interest thereon at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of February and August of each year until and including the day of their maturity, as follows, to-wit: \$125.00 on the first day of August 1910, and on the first day of August 1911, 1912, 1913, 1914, 1915, 1916, 1917, 1918, 1919, 1920, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924, 1925, 1926, 1927, 1928, 1929, 1930, and on the first day of August 1930, the principal sum of Five Hundred Dollars.

SECTION SIX: The City of Florida hereby certifies that the foregoing copy of said bonds and coupons shall be fully paid, to levy a sufficient tax and to see said sufficient funds in promptly pay the interest thereon and every of the said bonds as they shall respectively mature, and the said City of Florida hereby pledges and certifies to witness that no defense shall hereafter be set up or attempted thereto by the City of Florida. It is hereby ordered by the City of Florida, Ala., that the City Clerk or other officers of the said City, in each year set apart and collect from the general treasury of said City an amount sufficient to comply with the above requirements. And the above provisions in relation to the raising of the necessary funds for the payment of the interest and to create a sinking fund is hereby declared to be and shall be deemed and held to be an agreement and covenant not only with the purchaser of said bonds but also with the successors, heirs and assigns of the said bonds, and of the coupons thereon attached.

An Ordinance

To Prohibit Prize Fighting and the Exhibition of Moving Pictures of Prize Fights.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Florida, Ala., as follows:

Sec. 1

That any person who shall engage in a prize fight, boxing match or pugilistic encounter or contest, game or sport of like kind or description, whether with gloves or without, within the police jurisdiction of the City of Florida, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than fifty dollars or more than \$200 dollars.

Sec. 2

That any person who shall exhibit any moving or motion picture of any prize fight, boxing match or pugilistic encounter or contest, game or sport of like kind or description, within the police jurisdiction of the City of Florida, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than fifty dollars or more than \$200 dollars.
